Spares Survey – thank you to all the many members who contributed to the survey results and to Ian Seed who has collated them. An interim report will shortly be sent to all members to explain the results and some of the planned actions that will occur as a result of the survey.

Archives and Digitisation

One way of ensuring that we capture all of the history of the Lagonda marque is to digitise as much as we can so that is safe for future generations. We have now completed the first task and that is the digitisation of all Club Magazines. Len is now working on uploading them to the website so that, very soon, all members will be able to effectively electronically search for anything within all of our magazines. IN addition the list pf technical articles will be included with the Magazines to speed searching for these. This will be a fantastic and very useful service to members particularly for those who wish to understand which widget connects to which when carrying out a rebuild or those that wish to conduct historical searches.

Our next portion of this project, which is being coordinated with the Lagonda Heritage Trust by Kevin Lloyd-Bisley and the sub-committee, is to cost out the historically very important W.O.Bentley archives. Further progress reports will be announced in due course.

Terry Brewster owned a striking red LG45 LMRep, sometimes referred to as "The Fire Engine" Both he, and his wife Margaret, successfully campaigned this car in speed events for many years. A commemoration of Terry's life will take place at Pershore Abbey on 21st January at 12 noon. Members are welcome especially in a Lagonda, and colourful clothing is preferred.

Richard Campbell (Cam) died in October. He was a long term Lagonda Club member and owner of CPA 575, a modified M45. He was a well-known pig farmer in Dorset and had received an MBE for services to the pig farming industry in the UK. He leaves a wife, Pippin, children and grandchildren.

Greetings All once again.

Firstly, I want to recognise the effort of the new Editor of the Lagonda Club Magazine, Roland Bugler for the way he is subtlely changing the content to include ALL Lagondas and I urge all Members/Owners to contribute to the Magazine.

I also want to congratulate David Stone-Lee on the presentation of his DB 2.6DHC featured on page 20 of issue No 282. What a stunning image this is!

Next is a welcome to new Member/Owner Ean McDowell from the state of Victoria, Australia who is also the new owner of 3 DB series cars. Two are DB 2.6l saloons and the third is a DB 3l DHC. All are in need of restoration and Ean is up to the task as he has experience with a number of Classic restorations over some years.

These cars are Ean's first introduction to the DB series Lagonda. We wish him well and Australian owners have located some parts that he will require, stored in sheds around the country.

Ean draws our attention to the use of penetrating oils to aid the dismantling of mechanical components and recommends using a 'home brew' of A/T Fluid and lacquer thinners as a 50/50 volume mix and states that tests show this to be an aid to loosening fastenings that have seized. I'm sure we would all have experienced this problem over the years and worked some magic with tools, fluids and sheer brute force from time to time!

Martin Peters has advised that Ian Turner has located on Ebay -'Klassic Bits', a door strap for Triumph TR2/3 that is almost identical to the door strap used on 3l Lagonda DHC. Thanks Ian, one assumes you are restoring a 3l DHC?

I have received a Greetings card from Alan Heard. Most would be aware that Alan owns SMX -10, the first Lagonda 2.6 DHC. Alan advises that 'The Automobile' Magazine is running a story on the car in the January 2025 edition if you are interested. One can look up the contents of each issue online.

Just before the Christmas Season commenced. My local Car Club staged a 3 day run into the nether regions, using roads less travelled. Always a serious consideration in that in the event of a breakdown, help is quite some distance away.

I thought I would describe the region we visited, topically, attempting to avoid boring you with Australiana. Our system of classic car registration in NSW allows for 60 days of use annually on a Logbook entry scheme.

The trip commenced from a town named Tenterfield which is about 3hrs uphill driving for our group from the Northern Rivers of New South Wales.

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Tenterfield is recognised as one of the birthplaces of Federation in this country. Formerly we were a group of six separate British Colonies. In 1899 we became a Federation known as the Commonwealth of Australia.

We planned to take a former Cobb and Co coach trail north, stopping at will to take in interesting scenery - there's plenty of it up on the Granite Belt.

First stop was 'London Bridge', so named after two local bridge designs by I.K.Brunel, the British bridge designer who spent a lifetime building bridges and tunnels.

Next stop was a tribute to the building of 'Tank Traps' to impede the passage of supposed Japanese invaders during WW2, perhaps attempting to cross the Great Dividing Range. As well, the mountain passes had been mined to further hinder the enemy. Seems almost unreal in today's changed circumstances!

Moving on we found a reconstructed Cobb and Co coach house with a locally made coach on display. I'm telling you this because I believe the current Royal Coach maker is an Australian!

Soon we were in South east Queensland's grape growing region. We had crossed the border and were heading for Stanthorpe, centre of fruit and grape production and needless to say, winemaking.

In previous years this region was noted for mining gold, tin and other minerals. More recently it was settled by Returned Service men from WW1, then by Italian migrants who grew grapes and produced very powerful Grappa.

Now the region has been 'incentivised' by Government funding to become a wine producing region. 'Wine Tourism' has been established throughout the Granite Belt where climate and soil types have enhanced production of world class wines. All of the activities associated with drawing tourists to the region have been put in place including training for wine makers and presentation of food at a high standard. Accommodation also is available at levels that suit all.

There is an annual festival aptly named the Apple and Grape festival. It's not too difficult to mix the two together!

Wishing All Lagonda owners and enthusiasts a Happy New Year and I urge all to continue supporting the Newsletter and the Lagonda Club Magazine.


